

Important Choices for Phoenix Gay Community

When the voters of Phoenix chose the district system to replace the old at-large system of electing City Council members, it marked a new day for Phoenixians. A new day in which this city would finally have City Council members directly responsible to and representative of the voting and tax-paying citizens of the various areas of the city. A new day in which the rascals can finally be thrown out. Chief "rascal", Mayor Margaret Hance saw the handwriting on the wall, and chose not to run.

It's also a new day for the Phoenix Gay community. No longer are candidates elected city-wide, no longer do we have to choose from an enormous list of candidates from far-flung parts of the city, and no longer will the minority candidates be lost in the percentages, as in past elections. **Your vote, your voice is much louder now, and the opportunity to elect candidates sympathetic to our needs is far better now.**

In our on-going efforts to provide Phoenix Gay voters valuable information about candidates and issues, Citizens for Constitutional Rights (CCR) has once again examined and interviewed candidates in this election, as we have done since 1976. The information presented here is the result of work which began in April.

While a number of different questions

were asked of candidates over the summer, the most important one was this: "Would you support an amendment to the City Code of Phoenix expanding the anti-discrimination provisions to include age, handicap and sexual preference?"

This amendment was prepared some time ago through a committee of CCR members with the support of numerous community organizations. No plausible way could be seen to ensure passage of this amendment considering the make-up of the old City Council, and the decision was made not to present it until such time as it could conceivably become law. That time may very well be close at hand, depending on the outcome of this election. This is an important step for the local Gay community, and it would be sad indeed if we were to pass it up.

We urge you to read this information carefully, and then to go vote as an informed, concerned Gay Phoenixian. We must have representation on the Council, and the only way to get it is to elect those people who know our concerns and will respond to them. Don't pass up your opportunity to make Phoenix a better place for us all.

Mayoral Race Outcome Crucial to Phoenix' Future

The Goddard-Dunn race has been a heated one, having drawn the attention of both the media and the citizenry. With present Mayor, tired old Margaret Hance out of the picture (she's going to take a position as co-chairwoman on the Reagan Re-Election Committee, and we won't miss her!), the road is clear ahead for dynamic and new leadership.

The two candidates offer clear choices. On the right, there is Pete Dunn, former do-nothing Republican legislator, offering to maintain the status quo and supported by those same tired, old big-money, downtown people who kept Hance in office for all these many years. His idea of a progressive Phoenix is to build a highrise in every residential area, while tearing neighborhoods up with unneeded parkways to carry the rich and powerful to the financial centers, ignoring minority issues, and to keep Phoenix firmly in the clutches of the Right Wing. His election would ensure more of the same crap we've received in the past. His chief contributor has been Charles Keating, president of Continental Homes and founder of Citizens for Decency Through Law (CDC), the ultra-Right Wing nationwide organization of religio-politicos who picket porno bookstores and lobby our legislature for such *worthwhile* legislation as the infamous "Dildo Bill" (which Gay Rights lobbyists of CCR worked to defeat). We don't need any more of this brand of "leadership" in Phoenix.

On the other hand, there is Terry Goddard. Truly progressive, energetic, dynamic. His leadership abilities are unquestionable, and his position on human rights issues outstanding. The grassroots movement to elect Terry Goddard began over a year ago, and support for him is coming from a wide spectrum of the Phoenix electorate. While Dunn answers only to the rich and powerful few, Goddard is people-oriented and would serve to guide Phoenix in directions you and I will be proud of. He believes you should have no stumbling blocks placed in your way by the City, that your rights should be protected. With Goddard as Mayor, forward steps to a revitalized Phoenix can and will happen. With Dunn, a return to the repressive attitudes of Hance and her ilk would stand in our way. Goddard is the **ONLY** choice!

As a community and as individual Phoenixians, we owe it to ourselves to elect a man who cares — about the future of the city and about you as an individual. We unhesitatingly endorse Terry Goddard for Mayor.

Lynch's presence on the Council would be a detriment to all.



AUTOGRAPH PARTY AT BOOKS BROTHERS

TUCSON — Gary Larson, creator of *The Far Side*, will be in Tucson for an autograph party at Books Brothers, 3242 E. Speedway, on Tuesday, November 1 from 4:30 until 6:00PM. Larson's *The Side* appears daily on the editorial page of the *Arizona Daily Star*.

The cartoonist began drawing *The Far Side* in 1978 while working in a music store. After a two-day absence from work to try his hand at cartooning, he successfully sold six pieces to a local paper for \$90 and immediately quit his job. Syndicated by Chronicle Features since 1978, *The Far Side* has enjoyed meteoric success and now appears in 100 papers.

The present national tour is Gary Larson's first chance to meet his fans. At wildly successful autograph sessions in San Francisco, he signed 1,000 copies of his two books.

His first book, "The Far Side", was released in September 1982. It was Books Brothers' best selling humor book that year, and it achieved bestseller status on several national lists. Larson's second collection of cartoon panels "Beyond the Far Side" hit the stores last month.

Larson will be appearing earlier in the day at the Student Union Bookstore on the University of Arizona campus from noon to 1:30PM.

RAPE VICTIM RELEASED

NEW YORK, NY (GCN) — A State Supreme Court justice released a 36 year old Queens man who was raped by inmates soon after he arrived at the House of Detention for men at Rikers Island eight months ago, according to the *New York Times*.

Ernesto Insignares, the inmate, was convicted of selling two ounces of cocaine and faced a mandatory sentence of three years to life. Ordinarily, the sentence would be imposed without the possibility of parole. However, the judge who paroled him said, "The punishment meted out on the first night for this first offender constitutes a greater punishment for the crime than this court could legally or morally impose."

The judge also charged that the Department of Corrections had failed "to protect the defendant from the attack."

AIDS PANIC USED IN CAMPAIGN AGAINST GAY RIGHTS BILL

SACRAMENTO (GCN) — An ultra-conservative California state senator is using the unsupported "casual contact" theory of AIDS transmission as a reason to defeat AB-1, the state's anti-bias jobs bill, according to the *Bay Area Reporter*.

Senator H.L. Richardson (R-Glendoria) has said that AIDS is "contagious" and "is spread into mainstream America because of close contacts with AIDS victims." Richardson suggested that passage of AB-1 would "force" such contacts onto the general public. AB-1 would outlaw employment discrimination against gay men and lesbians.

Richardson has accused AB-1 proponents of supporting "sodomites and other perverts...which is an assault upon God." Richardson, supporter of the ill-fated Briggs amendment, announced this year that he will not seek another term in the California Senate. AB-1 is awaiting consideration by the Senate Finance Committee and may be voted on by the entire Assembly in the beginning of 1984.

POLICE PROPHYLAXIS

AUSTIN, TEXAS (GCN) — Lawmakers in this state have taken a novel approach to disease prevention. Texas residents who knowingly expose another person to gonorrhea or syphilis will face up to a year in prison and \$1,000 in fines, with the recent revision of the state's venereal disease laws.

"The thrust of the law was to eliminate as a requirement the pre-marital blood test for syphilis and to add a second pre-natal test," said Dick Conlon, senior public health advisor for the Texas Department of Public Health Venereal Disease Control Program. Conlon said that congenital syphilis is a major problem in the state. But another effect of the new law is to raise the maximum fine for knowingly transmitting the disease from \$50 to \$1,000.

Conlon acknowledged the difficulty in establishing that one person has knowingly transmitted a disease to another. "In all honesty, I don't think anyone ever has been charged," he said. Asked why the state would want to raise the penalties on a law that has never been enforced, Conlon replied, "I presume to make it seem more serious. Fifty dollars is not very serious. Syphilis and gonorrhea are very serious."

TUCSON — The Fineline, 101 W. Drachman, has completely remodeled the downstairs facility into a Levi/Leather bar named DICKS'. The Tucson Arizona Levi Leathermen (TALL) has already named it as their headquarters. DICKS', A Bar for Men, holds its formal opening tonite, October 28, at 9:00PM.

TALL will formally initiate the bar Saturday, Oct. 29 at 9:00PM when they will present an award to owner Dick Plowman, present Tucson's Bartender of the Month award and then present their club colors. Attire for the evening will be your best levi, leather or uniform. Prizes will be awarded. A new sight on the Tucson night scene.

EDITORIAL IS CALLED "CRUEL, VICIOUS, DISTASTEFUL"

OTTAWA, CANADA (GCN) — The Ontario Press Council, in the strongest judgement made in its eleven year history, condemned an anti-gay editorial which appeared in the *Sarnia Observer*. The council called the paper's actions cruel, vicious, dehumanizing, distasteful and unprofessional, according to the *Body Politic*.

The *Observer's* editorial, responding to a television program on the Armed Forces anti-gay witchhunts, labelled lesbians and gay men as "another species," "Moral degenerates," "Whishy washy types," and "a limp-wristed bunch of pansies."

Gays of Ottawa (GO), the group which filed the complaint against the paper, noted disappointment that no more concrete action than the condemnation could be taken by the Council. The *Observer* is only required to print the full text of the ruling.

"A newspaper can do injury to someone and the only recourse available is an opportunity for you to publicize that injury," said a GO spokesperson.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT CONSIDERS FEDERAL CHARGES AGAINST WHITE

SAN FRANCISCO (GCN) — Following the apparent failure of other attempts to block the parole of Dan White, prosecution on Federal charges is now being considered by the U.S. Department of Justice, according to the *New York Times*. A decision on whether to charge White with violations of the 1968 Civil Rights Act in the murders of Gay supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Moscone must be made by November 27, the fifth anniversary of the killings and the day the limit on prosecution of White expires.

Mayor Dianne Feinstein, members of the Board of Supervisors and thousands of other citizens have objected to White's release. Gov. George Deukmejian investigated the possibility of blocking White's parole himself, but California's Attorney General wrote an opinion which ruled out that option.

White was convicted of voluntary manslaughter on May 21, 1979, and was sentenced to seven years and eight months in jail. By law, he is entitled to time off for good behavior, and so is scheduled for release on January 6, 1984, after serving two-thirds of his sentence. Should White be paroled, Mayor Feinstein has requested that, as a condition of parole, he be barred from returning to San Francisco.

STUDS FOR GIRLS ONLY

WASHINGTON DC — (GCN) — The U.S. Army has decreed that women in uniform may wear earrings as long as they're not gaudy and "fit snugly against the ear." The new earring regulation specifies that acceptable earrings will be "spherical and unadorned, not to exceed one-quarter inch in diameter." They must be made of gold, silver or pearl and must be worn one to each ear.

When asked about the possibility of men being allowed to sport their studs, an Army spokesperson replied, "Are you kidding?"

COUPLE SUES OVER AIDS BIAS

WASHINGTON DC — (GCN) — A suit against the National Institute of Health (NIH) has been filed by a Washington area couple who claim they were harassed and humiliated at NIH where the man was being treated for AIDS, according to the *Washington Post*.

The \$2 million lawsuit says the woman's supervisor's at NIH, where she is an employee, told her in June to stop having lunch with her lover at work and not to bring him into the building without clearance. Her lover was being treated for AIDS at the Bethesda-based NIH.




PHOENIX-All we can say about the Octoberfest last Sunday at South Mountain Park is WOW. From beginning to end it was an event which was pure delight for all concerned.

from the editor...

Two weeks ago we made a statement that has become a source of misinformation. Basically it involved two points of view. At no time has any one person or group bothered to ask us to explain why we made such a stand. At no time was it meant to insult all the member of BABES.

We felt when we joined BABES that one of the goals of that organization was to support their members, look out for their best interests and to try to unify the Gay community and work together. This was a goal we personally felt very strongly about. I felt I was dealt with wrongly when I was personally insulted by a board member in a public place. I personally feel that is a time and place for business and the grand opening of a new bar is not the place.

Therefore the statement was made about being treated unprofessionally.

I agree with Garry Mangum, in that backstabbing and gossip behind ones back is cheap and disgusting. I do not understand why this behavior is accepted by the gay community, but someone making an open, upfront and "honest" statement is all but tarred, feathered and run out of town on a rail.

We do realize that we have a responsibility to our readers to report all happenings in Phoenix and Tucson honestly and to the best of our ability. We try to keep all of our readers informed to what is happening in both cities, however it is very difficult when press releases are given to us only after they have been printed in the competition, or many times not given to us at all.

I feel "personally" that it is unjust to talk about people behind their backs. I am a very honest person. I have never cheated anyone or tried to hurt anyone, at any time. A fact that anyone who has dealt with me can attest to. I have never said anything about anyone I would not say to their face. I have however been reported to have been seen in bars "putting down" all gay businesses. I find that extremely difficult to do since I do not go to bars except for business, or to cover functions. When I am in the bars I try to the best of my ability to act responsibly. I may joke and kid but never have I handled any bar personnel or owner with anything other than a professional manner. I have never tried to run their business or told them where and how to advertise. I do not pick fights in public, however I have been known to leave a bar when put in situations I can't handle in public.

I find it very disturbing to have to defend myself and the rest of the staff for being honest and open people.

We try at all times to do the best job possible in all of our work. When we are given the run around for weeks we have a very difficult time meeting deadlines and getting work done on time and to everyones satisfaction.

Having been in business for over 10 years and dealing with the gay community, I can say I have never tried to smear anyone's name or business. We know all to well how hard it is to make a business grow and prosper. I have given more than my share of dedication and support to the gay community even though I myself am not gay. I do so because I feel very strongly in the cause and also because the man I love happens to be Gay.

I am very sorry for any misunderstandings and will gladly clear up any questions, if given the opportunity. We have nothing to hide. We do not want to give up putting out the Attitude - we are not quitters - but very determined people doing a good job while trying to keep a sense of humor.

We have tried to give everyone an alternative to one sided reporting, advertising and reading material. We want to give everyone a different point of view, without censoring or rewriting anyones work. We try very hard to be just with everyone we do business with. If anyone has anything to say please let us know face to face or in writing.

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
