The people have spoken
...and a new day has begun!



Jubilant, newly-elected Phoenix Mayor Terry Goddard

When Terry Goddard strode jubilantly into the Navajo Room at the Hilton around midnight Tuesday, the room roared with applause and cheers. Echoing chants of "NO MORE MAGGIE" and "POWER TO THE PEOPLE" resounded through downtown Phoenix and doubtless even reached some twitching ears out on the side of Mummy Mountain, and while the huge throng cheered Terry, the rats were deserting the Pete Dunn Titanic in hurried droves. The people have spoken.

Goddard received a firm majority of votes — 66,000 to 56,000 — a truly remarkable accomplishment in Phoenix, around whose neck the Republican Right Wing oppressors have kept their stranglehold for more years than most of us have lived (including Terry Goddard, who is 36). It was a night to remember and some politicians are saying it is a trend that will carry over into next year's Presidential election race.

Throughout the Goddard campaign the Phoenix Gay community was very well represented and received Terry's encouragement. All of us who participated with our time, money and votes can be proud and pleased. We did, indeed, make a difference; this time an incredibly significant one.

However, the job is far from completed. In all but one City Council district (District 8 where incumbent Councilman Cal Goode won overwhelmingly), no candidate received a clear majority, hence there will be a run-off in those districts on December 13.

By far the biggest disappointment in the Council races was in District 4, where Gary Peter Klahr was our chosen candidate. Klahr was the best candidate for that district, and for us. He received our endorsement, but he did not get the endorsement of the *Arizona Gay and Lesbian Task Force* (ALGTF - Kirk Baxter, et. al.). When we read their endorsements and found Gary Klahr had been eliminated, we were shocked and horrified. Gary Klahr is, after all, the author of our new ordinance, and would gladly have introduced it, but the other Gay Rights organization in the Valley didn't see fit to endorse him. What the hell is wrong with these people, we thought, are they deaf and blind?! We have no idea how this disinforming misguidance influenced the outcome in District 4, but there is no doubt the figures would have been considerably different should they have given him a favorable endorsement; he *might have even won!*

We **MUST** have a majority on the Council! If we don't, we can forget the ordinance — and now that **MUST BE THE ISSUE** — the only issue!

In District 1 neither candidate could care less about us. You can stay home December 13 if you live in District 1.

Not so in the other districts — each has a candidate we can and must support. We urge you to vote for these people on December 13:

HAITIANS REMOVED FROM NEW YORK CITY AIDS RISK LIST

NEW YORK (GCN) — Health Commissioner David Spencer and other officials have removed Haitian-Americans from classification as a high risk group for AIDS. According to the New York Native, some health officers in New York believe that the number of AIDS cases in the Haitian community is too small compared to other high-risk groups, to continue listing them.

According to some Health Department sources, however, this decision may be politically motivated. Recently, Haitian spokespeople have said that the inclusion of Haitians is unscientific and racist and has caused Haitian-Americans to be discriminated against in employment and housing. Officials at the National Institute of Health and the Centers for Disease Control believe that Haitians should be included in the high-risk groups since the incidence of AIDS is at least ten times higher for Haitian-Americans than for the general population.

The New York City Health Department will continue to collect and publish data reporting the number of Haitian-Americans with AIDS.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR TUCSON HEALTH CLINIC

TUCSON — Tucson Alternative Lifestyle Health Association (TALHA) Gay men's clinic is located at 101 West Irvington and is open from 6:00pm to 8:00pm every Friday. The clinic has been operating for six months, and has seen over 120 patients in that time. Services available are AIDS screening, Hepatitis B screening, and VD screening and treatment. A \$5.00 donation is requested.

The clinic recently received a \$500 donation for AIDS screening from the Arizona AIDS Education and Research Fund.

TALHA is in need of doctors and nurses to volunteer their services. Anyone interested in volunteering, or for more information about the clinic please call John at 623-4531. Due to Veterans' Day, the clinic will be closed Friday, November 11.

FORUM ON AIDS IN TUCSON

TUCSON — On Wednesday, November 16, at 7:30pm the Tucson Lesbian and Gay PRide Committee in conjunction with the Tucson Alternative Lifestyle Health Association (TALHA) will present a forum on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). The forum will consist of Health Professionals delving into the facts and fallacies of this current health problem. Among topics to be discussed are 1. A definition of and pertinent information on AIDS. 2. Statistics about AIDS (nationally, statewide and locally). 3. Communicability of AIDS, and 4. Risk Factors: "What you can do to reduce the risk."

After all the speakers have finished there will be a question and answer period.

The forum will be held at Metropolitan Community Church (MCC), 560 South Stone Avenue (formerly Temple Emanu-El). Everyone in the community is welcome and urged to attend this informative evening on a very emotional issue.

GAY ATHEISTS BANNED FROM HOUSTON PRIDE MARCH

HOUSTON (GCN) — The American Gay Atheists are seeking legal counsel in a continuing controversy arising from the four-year ban on their participation in the Houston Gay Pride Parade, according to a press release issued by the American Gay Atheists.

The atheist organization was banned until 1988 from marching in the parade because they carried a banner in this year's parade which read "Christians leave a bad taste in my mouth." Parade organizers have also accused group members of "simulating" sex acts with an inflatable doll dressed as a nun. Don Sanders, national director of the group, says that the parade committee refused to let him see the video tapes which they say is proof of the irregularities. Sanders also says that the parade committee has refused to meet with him or any member of his organization to discuss the ban.

ANN ARBOR DISCRIMINATION CASE DROPPED BY CITY

ANN ARBOR (GCN) — The city of Ann Arbor will not issue a criminal warrant against a local restaurant accused of discriminating against three Lesbian workers, according to the Ann Arbor News. City Attorney R. Bruce Laidlaw said that his office had dismissed charges against the Pan Tree Restaurant after reviewing reports from the human rights section of the Personnel Department. Laidlaw said there was insufficient evidence that the three Lesbians had lost their jobs at the all-night restaurant on account of their sexual preference.

A small group of supporters of the Pan Tree Three, as the women were known, staged a sit-in at the restaurant, but did little to disrupt the business. One member of a local Gay/Lesbian group and an organizer of the sit-in said, "It's turned into a tea party."

PHOENIX — Last Sunday The Connection held their AIDS Benefit Auction. The auction which lasted all day, and was held on the patio, could not have asked for more beautiful weather. Donations for the auction included everything from art to a truck. All items donated were from within the gay community and believe it or not everything sold. Entertainment was provided by St. Tropez, who gave two benefit performances. It was their way of thanking the gays for their support.





ONE STEP FORWARD, THREE STEPS BACK

New York, NY (GAZE) — Some American attitudes towards Gays and Lesbians have changed according to a Gallup Poll recently released. The poll takers asked Americans about their feelings concerning homosexuality and homosexuals in the light of the AIDS crisis. 21% of those responding said they are less comfortable about having Gay friends because of AIDS than they were before the disease. Also, fewer people than before believe that homosexuality is an acceptable lifestyle. But more people than previously supported increased employment rights for Gay men and Lesbians.

Washington DC - The AIDS Hotline is being expanded because of the heavy volume of calls. Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret Heckler announced that five more telephone lines will be added and they will be answered 24 hours a day. Between 8000 and 10,000 calls have been received since the service opened in August. The toll-free number is (800)342-AIDS.

ROMANTIC DINNERS FOR HETS ONLY?

Los Angeles (GCN) - Two women have sued a restaurant here after being refused service in a curtained booth reserved for "couples" according to the Nations Restaurant News. After making an advance reservation for the booth, the two women were told they could not occupy it when they arrived. They were offered and uncurtained table, but they walked out instead. Their attorney, Glana Allred, said, "If a restaurant had a policy that two blacks or two Catholics could not sit together, everyone would understand that the policy is unacceptable and illegal. Similarly, we feel that insisting that two people of the same sex cannot sit together is also violative of the law. Dining should be a delight not a dilemma." The restaurant's manager, Walter Kulwitzky, defended the policy. He said the booths had always been reserved for "romantic dinners." He added, "If you can't seat people the way you want, you might as well close the place. The suit seeks \$250 in damages for each of the two women, as well as an injunction prohibiting discrimination against same-sex couples with regard to private dining.

BLACKS HELP GAYS

Washington DC — Civil rights, long an issue associated with Blacks, now is a rallying point within the Gay movement, and the alliance between the two groups is growing. The chair of the Congressional Black Caucus, Representative Julian Dixon (D-CA), as well as 16 others in the 20 member caucus, are co-sponsors of the Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights Bill. One-fourth of the bill's co-sponsors are Black, the highest percentage of any caucus in Congress. The Bill, H.R. 2624, extends fair employment and fair housing laws to Gay and Lesbian people. It is the brain child of the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL) an organization established seven years ago to fight for Gay issues in Congress. "There has always been Gay support for those fighting for civil rights and equality," said Dixon. "Gays are strong civil libertarians." GRNL is working with the National Coalition of Black Gays as well as Black and White Men Together to secure the co-sponsorship of the three remaining members of the Black Caucus, Representative Harold Ford (TN), Katie Hall (D-IN) and Gus Savage (D-IL).

CRANSTON APPOINTS LESBIAN

San Francisco - San Francisco Lesbian activist Jo Kuney joined the staff of Sen. Alan Cranston (D-CA) as the Senator's northern California field representative. Because of the demands of her new job, Kuney is resigning her post as vice-president of the Alice B. Toklas Memorial Democratic Club, San Francisco's largest Gay political club. The city's Gay press reported that with her appointment, Kuney may now be the highest-placed openly Lesbian staff person in government. (Advocate)

GAY CHAPLAIN

San Francisco (GayLife) - San Francisco's Police Department has named Metropolitan Community Church Minister James Sandmire as its first openly Gay Chaplain. Sandmire will minister to all members of the police department and said he would welcome an invitation to have a dialogue with a Christian group of San Francisco police officers, "Cops for Christ."

MILITARY REGULATIONS CLOUD JUSTICE FOR GAYS IN SERVICE

Although the Gay Rights movement has been changing the way that Gay men and Lesbians are treated by the military, (i.e. an honorable discharge instead of an undesirable one), being Gay and active duty is still not looked on with favor by the Joint Chiefs of Staff. This article is not an attempt or a definitive guide to military law and how it relates to Gay men and Lesbians, but rather is some advice concerning immediate measures that you should take if you find yourself and your sexuality in question by your command. The primary bit of advice that you should follow is DONT TALK. It's just like those police shows on TV, "...anything that you say can and will be used against you..." Regardless of what the questioning authorities tell you, they are not your friend, and talking to them will not make it easier on you. Do not help them do their job. Regardless of what they tell you, you DO have the right to remain silent. You are protected under the 5th amendment and also Article 31 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. If you are considered a suspect or have been formally accused (the questioning authority should inform you of this), get a lawyer. The military will provide you with a lawyer or you can request (in most cases) a civilian lawyer (which you pay for). Refuse to continue the questioning until you have talked to a lawyer and have him/her present during any questioning. The questioning authority may suggest that you talk to your Commanding Officer, your Division Officer, a psychiatrist, a doctor, or the Chaplain, but this is not advisable until you have talked to your lawyer. Once you have been formally accused of being gay, you have two options to take. (1) fighting the charges, or (2) admitting your sexual orientation and taking the discharge. Both of these options have their advantages and disadvantages, and neither of them is an easy decision. Before making a final decision, talk over your options with your lawyer, your friends, your family (if possible) and with anyone else whom you respect and feel comfortable with. Of course the best advice is not to get caught, and keep your sex life off the base, but if you find yourself in trouble, remember that you do have rights (even in the military) - so use them.

NGTF DOCUMENTS EPIDEMIC OF ANTI-GAY LESBIAN VIOLENCE

The National Gay Task Force (NGTF) reports that in the first eight months of this year, 1682 incidents of harassment, threats, and attacks against lesbians and gay men were reported to its Violence Project. Documented by the NGTF Crisisline and twelve local violence projects across the country, these incidents will be included in NGTF's first annual audit of anti-gay/lesbian violence, scheduled for publication early next year. During this same period, the gay community was hit by the first wave of violence attributed to "AIDS backlash." According to San Francisco's Community United Against Violence (CUAV), fear and hatred associated with AIDS was a motivating factor in nearly 20% of all incidents reported this year. The Doran Group in Seattle also reports that gangs of youths seeking to beat up "plague carrying faggots" were responsible for 22 brutal attacks this summer. In Northampton, in central Massachusetts, homophobic assailants have laid siege to the town's sizable lesbian community. According to Northampton's Gay and Lesbian Activists (GALA), over the past year lesbians were singled out for sexual assaults and other physical attacks; lesbian-identified establishments were vandalized, and hundreds of phone threats and other verbal harassment against lesbians were reported. Comments Virginia Apuzza, Executive Director of the National Gay Task Force, "As our communities have become more visible, so have the numbers of those who want to bludgeon us back into the closet. NGTF's Violence Project and other local efforts are working to make being openly gay or lesbian safe by documenting homophobic crimes, by demanding that the criminal justice system hold perpetrators accountable and by responding to the needs of survivors." Of the incidents reported to NGTF thus far, 57% (965) are verbal harassment/intimidation, 28% (478) are physical assaults (including sexual assaults and attacks with weapons), and 1% (15) are homicides. 4% (59) are incidents of arson or vandalism against the property of lesbian/gay people, and 10% (165) are other types of crimes not yet classified. 7% (119) of all incidents reported involved police harassment or brutality. According to Kevin Berrill, Violence Project Director, "These figures represent only a small fraction of the total number of incidents that actually occurred during this period. The great majority of lesbian and gay victims do not report attacks against them, and for too many still suffer the aftermath in silence and isolation. Nevertheless, these statistics are an important step forward in our effort to document the extent of anti-lesbian/gay violence. They are the product of close ties and increased cooperation between local anti-violence projects and NGTF, and will enable us to educate the police, the criminal justice system, victim service agencies, legislators, and the public about this problem and how to address it." NGTF's audit of anti-gay/lesbian violence will provide a detailed breakdown of all incidents reported in 1983 and will include incidents reported in the press, as well as those documented by the Crisisline and local anti-violence projects. Anyone who sees articles about incidents of homophobic violence are encouraged to clip and send them to NGTF. NGTF urges all victims of anti-gay/lesbian harassment or violence to make a report to their local violence projects. Those without a violence project in their community should call NGTF's toll-free Crisisline at 800-221-7044 (in New York, Alaska, and Hawaii only, call 212-807-6016). The Crisisline is open Monday-Friday, 3 to 9pm Eastern Time. Specially trained Crisisline staffers will take a confidential report and refer callers to local support services.

TKO CHOOSES HOME BASE

TUCSON — The Tucson Knight Owls (TKO), a men's social club, has announced that it now has a home bar. At the November meeting the membership voted Rita's Rendezvous as the club's home bar. The club's colors will be presented to Vinny and Rita Ciociarelli, owners of the popular establishment on Sunday, November 13 in conjunction with a Chuckwagon Bar-B-Que to be held from 5:00 to 7:00PM. The dinner consists of ribs, beans, salad and bread and will cost only \$3.99. Everyone is invited to attend.

TUCSON GAY YOUTH REACTIVATES

Tucson - With the departure of Jim and Jay, former directors of the Tucson Gay Youth Group (TGY), the organization has been inactive. Now the group is being sponsored by G.C.O.S. Inc., and meets twice monthly (2nd and 4th Fridays) at 7:30pm at 500 South Stone Avenue. The group is open to anyone from the ages of 14 to 25. TGY provides a support network for Gay youth. They have available community leaders, professional men and women, counselors and others who are concerned with helping the homosexual develop a healthy and positive self-awareness. Some services of TGY include: 1. Educational and recreational activities; 2. Supportive environment for peer group interaction; 3. Religious counseling; 4. Parent/Teen interpersonal relationship; 5. Guest speakers; 6. Rap and discussion groups; 7. Referral services and 8. Crisis intervention. For more information call 622-4536 or 792-3772. You are not alone.

At this time Why ONE Issue?

An after-the-election comment: "I didn't vote for him because of his stand on freeways." And another: "I didn't vote for him because...he's too fat...he's too ugly...drives a Lincoln." If you are a homosex or lesbian, in this time, there is but one issue. Whether in voting for City Council, for Mayor, for Legislator, Congressman or President, today you are your issue. And as long as your personal freedom is at stake, that fact will remain true. Candidates who respond positively to your decriminalization deserve your support, your vote. Furthermore, they deserve the support of the entire community who should speak with one voice, to themselves, to the candidates and to the community in which they live. For us to fail to endorse and vote for a strong supportive friend because they are seen as for or against transportation system, or because the candidate is not attractive or "premy" enough, and should that candidate lose, then we just might prove ourselves to be fools. Back in the "good ole days" of the Nazi empire in Germany, many of the pro-Nazi Jews and pro-Nazi homosex people were all too cooperative with that hideous, monstrous regime (sound current?). Cooperative for material gain - nor freedom (sound up-to-date?). They used their power and resources to aid the Nazis build a better transportation system - in this case it was railroads - and they grew in wealth (sound popular?). A little later, they all reaped the harvest of their endeavors. They all got to ride the new railway right to the Death Camps. And such was their reward for supporting the wrong side. Could such a self-defeating thing possibly happen here and now? Perhaps not in just the same way, but a somewhat similar scene may be unfolding in Phoenix today. Some of us did vote against Terry Goddard (and for Pere Dunn) because of his supposed stand on freeways. That's bad enough, but Terry won anyway. Worse, though, is what happened out in District 4 where Gary Perer Klahr was a candidate for City Council. His stand on human rights issues, minority issues - GAY issues - is impeccable. He has, time and again, risen to fight beside us and for us, and would do so again. He is the author of the new ordinance we hope to introduce in the new City Council. But something very sad happened out there - something that may come back to haunt us all. Gary Klahr did not receive the endorsement of one of Phoenix "gay rights" organizations, though another candidate in that district did receive it. How much did this influence the outcome of the election? We'll never know. But Gary lost nonetheless, and we have no one to blame but ourselves. This in itself is outrageous, but when you add the reasons for the lack of endorsement and votes, i.e., "He's too fat, he's too ugly, drives a Lincoln," etc., it staggers the mind. Not only could such a situation cause us all to have one less human rights advocate on the Council, but it could leave us all one vote short - one vote short on our new ordinance. At that point, we might as well have all voted for the right-wingers, instead of bothering to try to elect those among the candidates who are our friends. This story needs no more illustration. We want the ordinance, we need it. We are our own issue. We must not make the same mistake again. For this time - ONE ISSUE: YOUR FREEDOM. Dear Editor:


You recently published a letter from a prisoner asking people in the "gay community" to write to him. Let me warn the "gay community" that some of these lonesome prisoners are con artists.




